

Vice President in charge of Membership is Roseann Krane. She already has an active committee of Diana Sawin, Kit King, Terry Magnin, and Margaret Batesole.


Taking over the Website and Directory is **Christina Clemens.** Roseann has been doing it for years, and we are so appreciative. Great job, Roseann!!

# DKG Legislative Update May, 2023 by Karen Yee & Roseann Krane

#### **Assembly Bill 938**

Keep an eye on *AB 938* as a California lawmaker this last March introduced a bill that would raise salaries for teachers and other school staff by 50% by 2030. It is the latest legislative effort to tackle a worsening shortage of educators across the state.



AB 938, would create funding targets under the Local Control Funding Formula and would require school employers to report changes in salaries over the next seven years.

#### **Highlights on Governor's May Budget Revise**

We have a new shortfall of \$31.5 billion which could fluctuate due to state and federal tax delays and will not be finalized until October 15<sup>th</sup>. *Jennifer Baker, CalRTA Legislative Advocate says the Governor and his financial advisors have become quite sophisticated in handling shortfalls and avoiding big cuts.* 

#### **Educational Funding**

Cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) has been adjusted to 8.22% which would increase discretionary funding for LEA's by \$3.4 billion.

Decrease funding for Transitional Kindergarten during each of the next 3 years of implementation.

Sustained funding for development of a screening tool for screening K-2nd grades for reading difficulties, including dyslexia by 2025-26, including professional development.

Increased funding for revisions to specific areas of teacher credential.

### Additional significant adjustments:

\$8 million decrease for implementation of the Arts and Music in Schools. \$20 increase to bring back the *Bilingual Teacher Professional Development Program* through 2028-29 (60% of students entering CA schools today speak an other language).

\$7 million increase for implementation of *Restorative Justice* practices.

\$6 million increase for Golden State Teacher Grant Program.

- 1.6 billion for universal school meals.
- 8.8 million state contribution to CalSTRS General Fund.

## **Volunteer Opportunities**

The Museum of the San Ramon Valley does a lot for schools, especially the 3rd and 4th grades. In order to provide these programs we need volunteers. I am hoping that some of you will be willing to sign up for one of these programs.

#### 4th Grade Indian Life Program

In the fall the 4th graders come to the museum to learn about the Indians who lived in our valley. They learn about when and how they got here. They learn about their housing, food, clothing, and hunting. They use rocks to pound acorns for acorn mush, and they play games played by Indian children. Before the program starts there is a training session for volunteers. We need two volunteers for each session.

#### Tassajara One-Room Schoolhouse

Starting in January all third graders, dressed in costumes, come to the Tassajara School for a morning of school like in 1888. Two teachers are needed for each session. Everything is provided, including a costume. There is a training session before the program starts. If you would like to be the lead teacher you might want to come out to the school to observe one day. This is a fun thing to do.

#### **Passport Program**

Every third grader receives a passport that takes them to 13 historic sites in the valley. Three of the sites are at the museum and the museum needs docents to help students and other people view the museum displays.

#### **Cemetery Tours**

The museum offers tours of the Alamo Cemetery. Needed are people who will wear a costume and "come out of their grave", telling about their life as a valley pioneer to a cemetery tour. There might be three tours a year.

I have done all of these programs and have enjoyed every one. I hope you will consider signing up for one. Call me and I will direct you to the right contact.
