LINJUN FAN

We had a wonderful speaker at our joint meeting with AAUW. Linjun Fan was inspiring as she told of her growing up in China, and the many sacrifices her mother made for her daughter. She spoke about how all of China at that time was allowed only one child preferably a boy. Linjun Fan is an international fellow, who will soon complete her M.A. in journalism at UC Berkeley. In August, Linjun filmed and edited video stories on the Beijing Olympics for the website of McClatchy newspapers, formerly Knight Ridder. Her story featured swimmer Michael Phelps. She also interviewed volunteers at the games (there were 70,000 volunteers) followed an American sports columnist adventure in Beijing, among other assignments. In 2007, Linjun created "Albany Today" a community news website that has 3 - 5 thousand hits each week, and where she has produced more than 100 news stories, photos, and video clips for local residents in Albany, California. The successful website is used as a model by the journalism school at UC Berkeley for training students in providing

community services. Linjun grew up in the countryside in the People's Republic of China. Conquering poverty and a lack of educational resources, she graduated from China's top university and has worked for two renowned news agencies.

Through her work in journalism, she plans to promote the well-being of disadvantaged people in China. She was delightful and an example of what intelligence, persistence, and hard work can do.
