We even saw one thousand kindergarten students, dressed in uniforms, doing physical education exercises. Wenyi talked about the differences of educational practices in both countries. There were lots of questions from the audience and most of us agreed that we would like to visit! Thanks to our presenters for providing such an enlightening and engaging program for us! INTERESTING CHINA!

We enjoyed a fabulous presentation on education in China, by our own **Sharon Keeton**, newly retired principal from Montevideo, **Carol Loflin**, principal at Quail Run, and **Nadine Rosenzweig**, principal at Live Oak - all SRVUSD elementary schools.



They visited sister schools Changzhou and Hangzhou, each having from 1900 to 6000 students. They also participated in a trip sponsored by the College Board and Hanban (the Chinese Confucius Institute), visiting the cities of Guangzhou, Huai'an, and Beijing. Our presenters shared videos of schools in China showing students in uniforms - learning, singing, and being taught by power point lessons developed by their teachers on their own time. Word walls in English, "turn and talk" activities, and lots of questioning strategies were observed in Chinese schools.

Technology and the arts are highly valued in China, with many students participating in singing, dancing, opera, and of course ~ calligraphy. They noted that there was an emphasis on "pride in school." Parents and grandparents are very involved and have great respect for teachers. Typical school hours are from 7:50 until 4:40, but children have a two-hour break at lunch when children can go home and are expected to nap so they can be focused for the afternoon.

Schools in China are very competitive, and children memorize from a very young age. BIG exams are given twice a year. Students are ranked (which is a controversial subject to some parents in China).



Guest Chinese teacher, **Wenyi Gui**, gave a wonderful power point examining the differences in American schools and those in China.

She explained that instead of one-to-one, parent conferences were done in front of a group of all parents, and children's grades are displayed for all to see. Classes are very large and teachers are strict and direct. An interesting fact that we learned was that "eye exercises" are mandated by the government each day involving massage of temples, noses, etc. all done to music.



Carol Loflin has a dual immersion program at her school where half the day is taught in English and the other half, Mandarin Chinese. Nadine and Sharon expressed the opinion that we need to offer Mandarin as an alternate to Spanish or French - at a very early age, not waiting for middle school.

We thank our wonderful presenters for their honest sharing, taking time to bring all the projectors and videos for our enjoyment, and for allowing us to experience their trip to China vicariously. Well done, ladies!

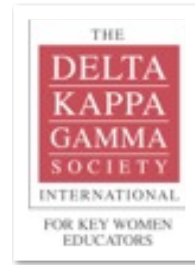
